Sustainable cocoa without deforestation

Background

In Côte d'Ivoire, about 7 million people are involved in cocoa farming. Although the country has a major influence on the export market as the world's largest cocoa producer, half of the small farmers live below the poverty line due to highly fluctuating cocoa prices and the lack of local markets. This is where the global project "Green innovation centres for the agriculture and food sector" comes in, with the aim of improving local sales and increasing value creation in the country. These objectives are achieved through the promotion of innovation along the value chain. At the same time, the most important natural capital in Côte d'Ivoire must be

preserved: Of the original 16 million hectares of forest, only about 3 million remain today - because cocoa is mainly produced in monoculture on deforested land. Instead of constantly expanding the area under cultivation, we want to promote alternatives for intensifying cultivation without expanding existing areas. We also promot the creation of additional sources of income by diversifying cash crops.
